- **CONFERENCE CHAIR:** Kelly A. Henrici, Executive Director of the Program in Law and Technology, University of Dayton School of Law

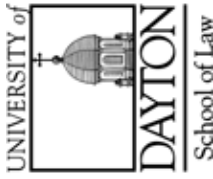
